## **BLACK EXCELLENCE PLAN**

In 2019, Denver Public Schools passed the <u>Black Excellence Resolution</u>. As part of the Resolution, each DPS school completes a Black Excellence Plan (BEP), which is a strategic document that allows schools to prioritize Black student success. At the core of BEPs is a commitment to lifting up and highlighting Black Excellence while actively working to dismantle oppressive systems and redesigning for equity, inclusion and Black student success.

Ashley Elementary is working through our BEP for the 2024-2025 school year.

- Improve the social, emotional, and mental health of Black students as measured on the BESS survey. We would like to decrease the percentage of Black students reporting extremely elevated Socio-Emotional health from 18% to less than 15% by the End of the Year. Compared to last academic year, we have already seen some improvement.
- Improve Black student proficiency in math as measured on the District Interim Assessment. We aim to increase MAP test 18% to more than 30% on the District's Interim.
- Increase the number of K-2 Black students on grade level or above as measured by Read ACT data. We aim to
  increase from 54% to 65% by the End of the Year.

BLAIR-CALDWELL LIBRARY A BRIEF HISTORY



#### Blair-Caldwell Denver Public Library

The Denver Public Library Commission named the Blair-Caldwell African American Research Library. Former Mayor Wellington Webb and First Lady Wilma Webb proposed the name, which combines the last names of Omar Blair, the first black president of the Denver school board, and Elvin Caldwell, the first black City Council member.

This particular library has pictures, artifacts, documents and a whole level dedicated to African American History. *Ashley students will visit soon!*

#### Black American History Museum & Heritage Center

The Museum is housed in the former home of Dr. Justina L. Ford, the first licensed African American female physician in the state of Colorado.

While famous for telling the story of the Black cowboys, the museum tells the stories of those early African Americans who came west and performed as miners, soldiers, homesteaders, ranchers, blacksmiths. schoolteachers, lawmen, and every other profession needed to build up and develop the West.
